# Mrs Lily Thomas, founder of the Burton on Trent and District Prisoners of War fund

In 1915 Mrs Lily Thomas of Stapenhill founded the Burton on Trent and District Prisoners of War Fund sending parcels to POW from Burton who were facing shortages of food and clothing. After the war Lily said that her committee had sent out 5,000 parcels independently and then 20,750 parcels under the Red Cross scheme.



Lily Thomas was born Heny Lily Fridel Harris in 1875 at St Peter Port Guernsey and on 15<sup>th</sup> January 1906 Heny Harris married Edward Thomas of 34, St Leonards Street, London. Edward was a brewery manager at brewers Salt and Co. In 1911 the couple were living at 31 Malvern Street, Stapenhill.

In February 1915 Lily decided something should be done to help Burton prisoners of war in Germany. Lily sent five parcels with five shillings worth of food in them and received acknowledgment back in five weeks. She opened a subscription list in a letter to the local newspapers, but public sympathy was slow to realise the need and respond to the appeal.

Lily founded the Burton on Trent and District Prisoners of War Fund in 1915 and was the secretary of the organisation. From February 1915 to June 1918 she sent 16,120 parcels to Burton Prisoners of War at a cost of £7,000. Packing was first done at a storeroom in Lily's house in Stapenhill; each parcel required labelling and the completion of three government forms. During Easter 1916 the parcels depot moved to a lock-up shop in Main Street which still stands today facing St Peters Bridge. The depot remained there until June 1918.

In May 1915, the Mayor, Alderman J S Rowland gave his support to the establishment of a committee, whose members included Alderman T E Lowe, H W Stein, S H Evershed, Mrs J J Stockley and Mrs Webb.

Your local Post Office has seen a reduction in trade. Opening hours have been reduced to three days a week, please help them to keep it open by giving them your custom.






# Mr and Mrs John and Joyce Lyons are The winners of our Good Neighbour Award 2016

# **December growing tips**

**LAWNS** If the grass has still been growing it may be necessary to give the lawn a cut but not too close. Remove fallen leaves off lawns so they don't block out light and air to the grass. Try to avoid walking on the grass after a frost as it can damage it. Consider repairs to damaged areas and edges.

**THE GARDEN** Gather up fallen leaves from lawns, pond and borders and compost them. A great time to take hardwood cuttings. Clay soils can be improved by digging in composted bark and well-rotted manure. If shrubs need moving now is the time do so, but don't damage the roots. It's worth checking that tree ties are secure.

THE GREENHOUSE Disinfect the greenhouse, after removing the last crops and debris. If you use the greenhouse in the winter then insulate as well as heat. Look carefully at plants for pest and disease, perhaps each week. Keep well ventilated and the air moving to help prevent the spread of fungal disease. Avoid getting the leaves wet when watering. Dead leaves and faded flowers should be removed, to help avoid disease.

**VEGETABLE GARDEN** Stake up any sprout stalks that are leggy. Remove any plant debris to help prevent the spread of disease. Dig over empty areas and apply organic matter, giving it time to be ready for next year. Parsnips can be left until needed, as can Turnip, Swedes, Parsnips, Celery, Brussel sprouts and Beetroot, bear in mind getting them out of frozen ground maybe impossible. Apple and pear trees like to be pruned at this time of year as do gooseberries, red currants and autumn raspberries. Check all stored fruits and vegetables on a regular basis for rot and disease. It can be a good time to plant new fruit bushes and trees but not if the ground is frozen or waterlogged.

HOUSEPLANTS Reduce watering of houseplants. Check that they are getting enough light; perhaps move to a sunny windowsill. It's a good time to plant Amaryllis bulbs. Cyclamen prefer a cool room and watered from below on a tray, not in the pot. Place Poinsettias in warm room, away from draughts to help them last longer. (on the day you buy them, avoid the cold) Hyacinths like a cool room, if it's too warm the flowers may not last.

# **Beaufort Road Accidents**

Staffordshire County Council is pushing forward with plans to reduce speed and accidents near Hargate Road and £4,500 has been secured this financial year for the initial design phase to commence. County highways engineers will be on site on 18 November to understand what the residents and local Councillors would like, they will then produce plans ready to go out to consultation. Following some great feedback from local residents to my last update; we may be looking at two sets of full width speed humps to reduce excess speed on the dangerous bend. Attention will be paid to the size and shape of the bumps to ensure they slow speed down but not damage vehicles. As soon as the design phase is over, the plans will then be taken to Brizlincote Parish Council for scrutiny. As ever I will keep you posted through these updates and please do contact me if you have any concerns about this or indeed any issue in Brizlincote.

### Mrs Lily Thomas (continued from page 1)

An Act of Parliament in August 1916 required the registration of war charities, the establishment of a committee and the appointment of an auditor. The Burton Prisoners of War Relief Fund was established and held its first meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> August 1916 when Lily Thomas was appointed Secretary and the Dowager Lady Burton became first president. Lily Thomas' first report showed that there were 65 names on the register of POW and that 1,684 parcels had been sent.

On 1st December 1916 the government instituted a new scheme whereby privately sent parcels were discontinued and three authorised parcels per fortnight were sent to each POW. Only food and tobacco could be sent, not clothing, boots or medicine. The postmaster of Burton, Mr R H Burt arranged for postmen to collect parcels from the depot on a handcart with a maximum load of 300 lbs.

Lily eventually got a grant of £60 from the Mayor's Fund. This was welcome as by October 1917 she had 120 POW on her list. The breweries did not subscribe until 1918, but this was because they were not asked to. Lily feared a take-over and relied on unsolicited donations. Among the many organisations which assisted were the Railwaymen's Relief Committee, Silver Prize Band and the Excelsior Band. Other bodies who helped included No 1 and 2 Company Boy Scouts, Guild St Boys School who contributed a guinea a week and the girls a guinea a fortnight, plus socks. The Viola Concert Party also raised money and Mrs Gee organised scores of whist drives.

Expenditure jumped from £3,600 a year to £12,000 and the work was still growing when the cease- fire came on  $11^{th}$  November 1918.

Burton prisoners began to arrive home in December 1918 and had a civic reception at the Town Hall. In her speech, Lily said that the Burton Committee had sent out 5,000 parcels independently and then 20,750 parcels under the Red Cross scheme.

There was another reception at St Pauls Institute on 30<sup>th</sup> January 1919 when Lily was presented with a silver tea service in recognition of her work and a number of other workers also received gifts. The presentation to Lily was made by Corporal Murkin who had been taken prisoner as early as October 1914. In her reply Lily said that the work had been a labour of love and was taken up at a time of personal bereavement. She assured the ex-POW that looking after their welfare had done her as much good as them.

She died aged 66, after a brief illness on 10<sup>th</sup> March 1941 at Spring Dale, 37 Bretby Lane (the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Thomas and Marguerite Spencer.) Her funeral took place at Stapenhill Cemetery.
